As a Trail Ambassador (TA) makes her patrol, she notices a person starting down a social trail to the parking lot instead of using the A.T. loop as shown on the maps. She gets their attention, and then patiently explains using the Authority of the Resource technique she was trained in why the trail is closed and how to use the loop trail to get back. Once informed about the resource damage hiking off trail causes, the hiker gets back on the trail and follows it back to their car. Each small win adds up to a lot over the course of a year.

This year's meeting was in Damascus VA on April 22 - 24, and attended by about 75 people from the clubs, Forest Service, National Park Service (NPS), SAWS (Southern Appalachian Wilderness Stewards), and ATC.

North Carolina Historical Marker Unveiled for CMC's George Masa

On April 8th, North Carolina unveiled a new Historical Highway Marker in downtown Asheville to honor George Masa. I was there, and Carolina Mountain Club president, Tom Weaver, had the honor to help pull the unveiling cord. Masa was an early member of CMC. He died penniless in 1933. CMC had to pay for his burial and memorial stone in Riverside Cemetery. In 1961, Masa had a 6,000-foot mountain named for him. Now he has one of only 1,600 historical markers in our state. His tireless work in mapping the Appalachian Trail and striking photographs of the Great Smokies resulted in preserving these indescribable treasures that we all enjoy today.
